We refer you to our previous submission made through Round 1 consultation. Regarding this Round 3 consultation, we submit the following:

· Safety Inspector (under building and engineering):

• We understand that being placed under engineering and public safety, currently this role is likely intended to apply to those working for regulators/state agencies.

However the tasks listed are easily confused with those performed by WHS generalist practitioners and professionals.

In reality, 'Safety inspectors' perform very different roles to WHS generalist practitioners and professionals. Inspectors generally represent regulators or other investigative bodies, typically state-funded. However the way this role is currently described, it would likely confuse WHS generalist practitioners

and professionals.

We submit that this role should be explicitly clarified and defined as those working for state regulatory bodies, and not those working in general industry or for the public sector.

We have more than 4,000 members across Australia. AIHS members form part of a broader WHS profession of approximately 20,000-30,000 working in Australian workplaces. The limitations of the current ANZSCO coding as they relate to the WHS profession prevent the development of clear occupational data on the actual number of people in Australia and New Zealand undertaking work health and safety duties.
